INTUG regulation

INTUG 1999 review

- very little increase in harmonisation
- complicated consultation/approval mechanisms instead of a European regulator
- no European licences
- harmonisation is very much slower than the mergers and acquisitions of the operators

INTUG conclusions

- a question of balance
- regulatory regime could be too weak to control emerging global oligopolies
- government may be misguided in the influence they can have on this sector for industry and cultural policy
- new legislation will have to last a long time
