- Universal International Freephone Numbers (UIFN) +800
- European Telephony Numbering Space (ETNS) +3883
- global numbers for
 - shared-cost
 - premium rate
- ENUM
- IPv6

INTUG etns

- European Telephony Number Space
- country code +3883
- numbers now available
- resistance from incumbent operators
- major barriers to calling
- no numbers assigned so far

INTUG what enum does

- identifies services and addresses associated with an E.164 number
- does not provide routing information
- does not ensure the DNS is populated
- does not ensure competing services interconnect or interwork

Enhancement of Numbering and Naming tElephone NUmbering Mapping Every Number Uselessly Manipulated

INTUG for each user it can give

- Session Initiation Protocol (SIP)
- electronic mail address
- another E.164 number
- Short Messaging Service (SMS)
- Lightweight Directory Access Protocol (LDAP)

INTUG enum failings

- no privacy function
- database needs to be populated
- E.164 is a poor identifier – office? mobile? home?
- DNS was never designed for this
- hard to deliver real-time functions
- at least Instant Messaging services have populated data bases

INTUG IPv6 task force

- announced by Commissioner Liikanen on 24 April
- to report to heads of government
- they will give it political impetus
- is there really market demand?
- are there regulatory reasons for wanting IPv6?

INTUG DG Competition

- sector investigation of 27 July 1999
 - international roaming
 - leased lines
 - local access
- merger approvals
- Mario Monti, Commissioner, is robust in his protection of consumers
- shortage of staff
- few formal complaints, fewer kills

INTUG Leased lines inquiry

- launched October 1999
- working document August
- public hearing September 2000
- on-going discussions with NCAs
- Worldcom and GTS pushing on provisioning

INTUG Local access inquiry

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INTUG Int'l roaming inquiry

- launched January 2000
- working document December 2000
- on-going discussions with NCAs
- energies currently diverted to the Eurocall scheme

INTUG Vodafone Eurocall Scheme

- needs approval by DG Competition
- announcement expected
- home country plus European roaming
- confederation of operators
- discounts on the IOTs are **only** passed to Eurocall customers

INTUG Eurocall issues

- Scheme does not address the issues in the competition inquiry
- benefits to be passed on selectively
- does not match the integration claims of the big operators
- a price of 1 per minute is not
 - comparable with the USA
 - competitive
 - seen as realistic

INTUG Seventh report

- Sixth Report on Implementation of the Regulatory Framework
- European and trans-border issues
- opportunities for input
- naming and shaming of
 - member states
 - national regulatory authorities
 - incumbent operators

INTUG sixth report

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INTUG seventh report

- work has already begun
- to appear by the end of year
- initial meetings already held
- 15 country hearings in September
- also written submissions

INTUG EU & trans-border issues

- leased lines
- international roaming charges

INTUG new legislative package

- we **are** moving towards competitive markets!
- before the Parliament and the Council
- very heavy lobbying continues
- contentious points are now defined
- will **not** be finished this year!
- then it must be transposed into national law in all 15 member states and in candidate members

INTUG new regulatory process

- define the markets
- test if they are not competitive
- check to see if anyone has Significant Market Power (SMP)
- impose sanctions and limits on SMP operators

Means lots of work for users and for NRAs

INTUG contentious issues

- transparency measure
- SMP
- mobile telecommunications
- licence fees
- ETNS/+3883

INTUG political forces at work

- Commission
- Parliament
- Member states and NRAs
- incumbent operators
- new(ish) entrants
- the Cartel
- industrial policy étatisme

INTUG harmonisation

- the "transparency" measure
- gives very little sense that we are moving towards harmonised regulatory regimes

INTUG smp

- Significant Market Power
- competition law definition of dominance (single and joint)
- can the GSM operators evade it?
- Draft Guidelines on implementation

 public workshop on 18 June

INTUG mobile telecoms

- termination to mobile
 - cost oriented
 - transparent
- international roaming
 - cost oriented
 - transparent
 - price displayed to user



INTUG the cartel

- lobbying
 - highly competitive sector
 - no need for regulation
- pushed DG Comp to publish
- MEPs found the Working Document
- Wim van Velzen MEP called them a cartel


INTUG mobile Internet

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INTUG saving 3G

- Commission under pressure to do something for and from:
 - manufacturers
 - operators
- published a Communication with no legislative proposals
- 3G or the Mobile Internet?

INTUG INTUG response

- operators said the payments were justified
- only real change is to cost of capital
- they knew what they signed up for
- need for genuine competition
 - MVOs
 - independent service providers
- there are other technologies around

INTUG forms of network sharing

- joint ownership of infrastructure with all operators as MVNOs
- mast sharing
- site sharing
- third party mast infrastructure
- national roaming

Must show economic and technical benefits for customers.

INTUG unlicensed spectrum

- GSM pico cells
- frequencies
 - 2.4GHz
 - 5.8GHz
- protocols
 - DECT
 - Bluetooth
 - IEEE 802.11 (a + b)

INTUG GPRS

- control of customer information
 - identity
 - location
- Network Address Translation (NAT)
- fits very poorly with the traditional regulatory framework

INTUG summary

- everything is slow(er)
 - new legislation
 - competition law inquiries
- the cartel continues to lobby
- new games
 - services over GPRS
 - limiting unlicensed spectrum
