
INTUG leased lines


- an issue for INTUG since 1974
- raised by us at ITU in 1979
- repeatedly raised with EEC and EU
- most recently:
 - Public Hearing September 2000
 - extending reporting by NRAs to higher speeds
 - ONP Committee October 2001
- a **continuing** market failure

INTUG a changing market

- prices continue to fall
- competition develops slowly
- cross-border circuits between major business centres are now cheaper
- prices have fallen much faster in the USA
- cross-border circuits outside major centres show little or no change
- some EU countries show few signs of competition

INTUG comparisons

- leased lines are often the only available technological option
- prices for local circuits remain a significant barrier to e-commerce
- costs greatly between Member States and Accession Countries
- there are disparities between national and cross-border costs
- the EU is at a competitive disadvantage to the USA

INTUG conclusions

- actions necessary in:
 - Member States
 - Accession Countries
- specifically to:
 - target high local circuit costs
 - press for higher service levels
- benchmark and ensure compliance with commitments in
 - *e*Europe
 - *e*Europe+

INTUG the new procedure

- about 16 months away
- need to define markets:
 - services
 - geographies
- testing of markets:
 - competition
 - SMP 2.0
- imposition (or not) of obligations:
 - existing
 - new
