INTUG fixed broadband

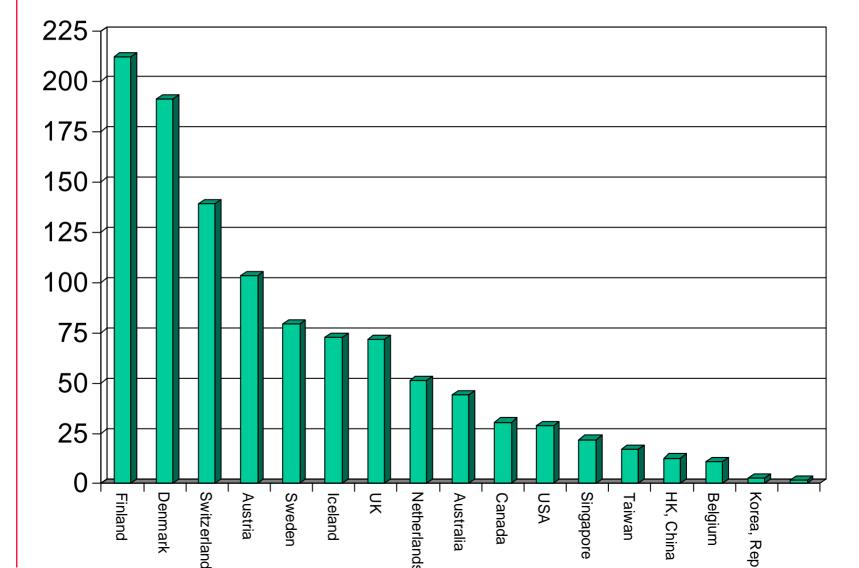
- South Korea
 - saturated at 12 million lines of 8Mbit/s
 - trials of VDSL at 13-50Mbit/s
- Japan
 - added 1.4 million lines in Q1 at 8 or
 12Mbit/s (60% non-incumbent on UNE)
 - US\$ 29/month for 12Mbit/s plus WLAN
- Hong Kong SAR
 - 1.5Mbit/s, 3Mbit/s and 6Mbit/s at one tenth the unit price of Verizon

INTUG over-priced and slow

- defending revenues
 - leased lines
 - ISDN
 - extra PSTN lines
- waiting for competitors to die
- waiting for the results of lobbying

So people try to bypass incumbents using IEEE 802.x

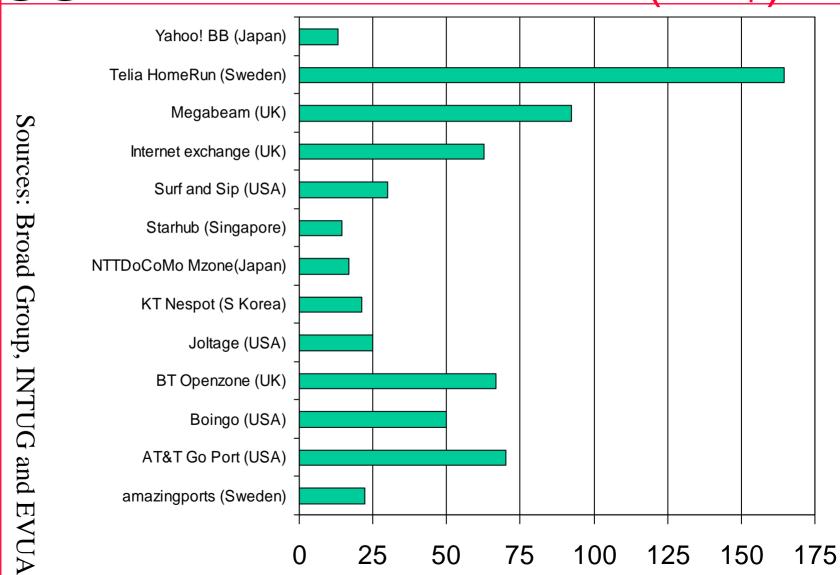
INTUG Fixed Wireless Access

- great promises but
 - some voice success
 - very little success in data
- could be costs of
 - sites (inspections and preparation)
 - equipment
- but horrible clashes of CDMA/WLL with cellular in:
 - India
 - South Africa

INTUG Wireless LAN

- global best practice:
 - unlicensed
 - failing which, broad class licences
 - 2.4GHz and 5GHz should both be opened
- household PCs and appliances
- extensive business use
- public service at "hot spots"

INTUG one month of PWLAN (US\$)



INTUG 2G: GSM, CDMA and PHS

- considerable successes
- helped to close the digital divide
- market abuses
 - international mobile roaming charges
 - fixed-to-mobile call termination
 - SMS or text messaging
- tens of millions of wireless customers do not have a fixed line or cable TV to provide broadband, it will have to be wireless

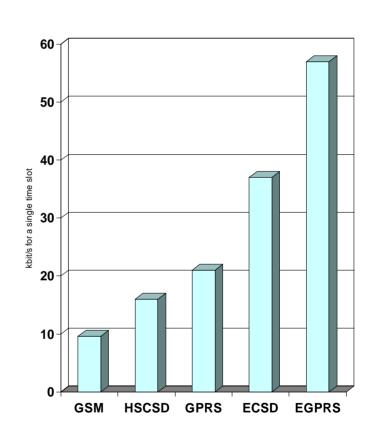
INTUG 2.5G

GPRS

- ISDN for cellphones
- slow transmission speeds
- expensive at home, horrendous abroad

EDGE

- still a promise
- CapEx on GPRS not yet recovered
- cdma1000 1X



INTUG mobile data in USA

AT&T Wireless

- mLife Local Plan Next Generation US\$ 30 per Mb
- mMode Mega US \$7.99 for 1 MB then US\$ 10 per Mb
- US\$70 per Megabyte when roaming abroad
- GoPort (WLAN) at US\$ 3 9 per day with a few hundred hot spots, of which 8 in DC

• T-Mobile t-zones (GPRS)

- Service US\$ 3 per Megabyte
- Pro first 10 MB for US\$10 then per US\$ 9.99 per MB
- US\$ 15.00 per megabyte roaming in Europe and Asia

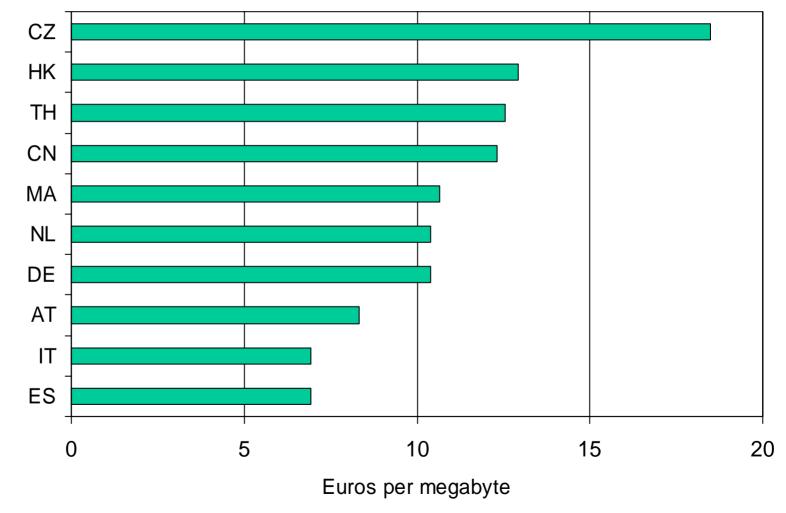
• T-Mobile HotSpot (WLAN)

- US\$ 39.99 per month or US\$ 0.10 per minute or US\$
 50.00 for 300 pre-paid minutes (in blocks of 10 mins)
- 2350 locations, of which 25 Starbucks in DC plus AA lounge at IAD

INTUG what does US\$50 buy?

- AT&T Wireless
 - 1.6 Mbytes on mLife (GPRS)
 - 16 days on GoPort (WLAN)
- T-Mobile
 - 16 Mbytes on t-zones service (GPRS)
 - 300 pre-paid minutes on HotSpot (WLAN)
- Verizon
 - just over a month at 320kbit/s ADSL

- 802.11 has killed HomeRF and Hiperlan
- 3G severely (fatally?) self-injured
- Wi-Fi looks much cheaper than GPRS
- VoWiFi will be killer app
- wireless is a useful way round the regulatory barriers created by incumbents
