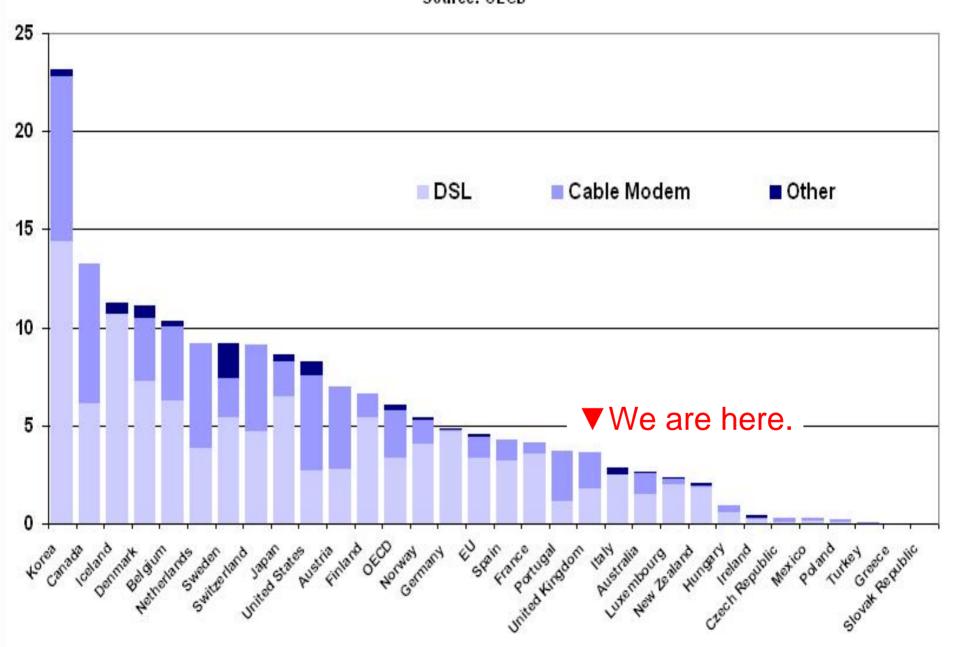

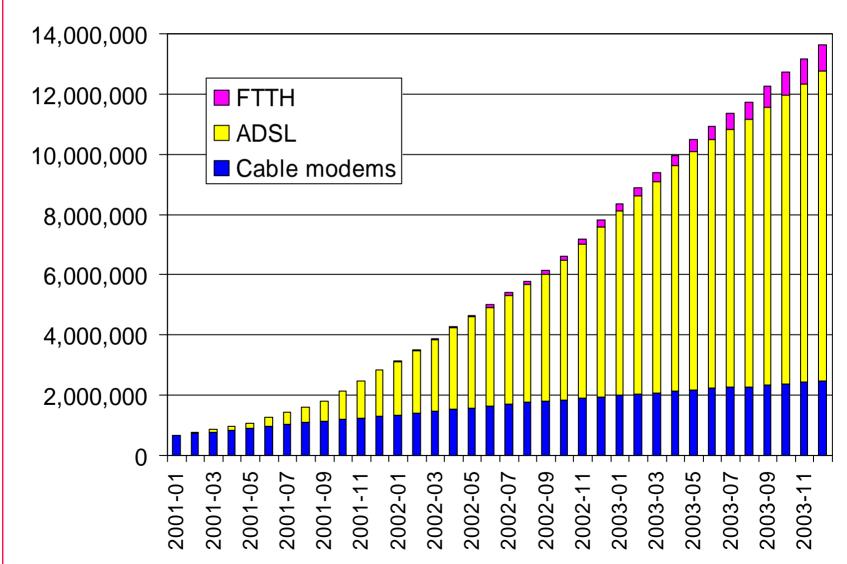

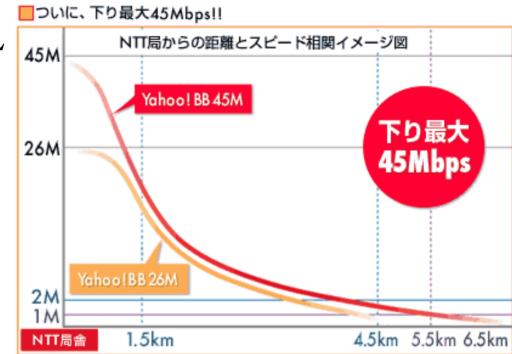

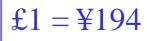

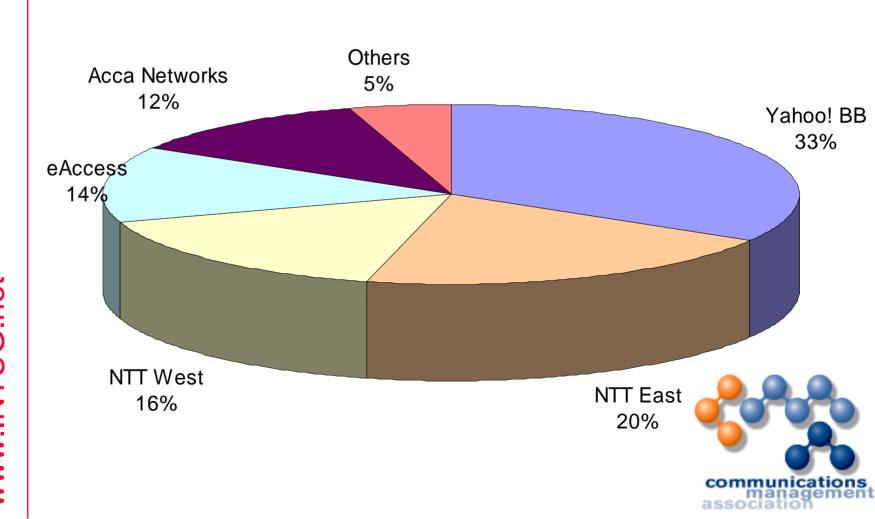

INTUG ICTs and the economy

- neither technology nor deregulation for its own sake

INTUG the new legislation

- Pan-European legal framework
- operators struggling to get out from under any and all regulation
- shift in the burden of proof
- we need for a very strong regulator
- we should benchmark OFCOM resources not against other NRAs but against operators

INTUG conclusions and the future

- twenty years of liberalisation has really been "political" game playing by the operators
- operators use policy debates to preempt competition and regulation
- broadband leadership is firmly in Asia
- mobile leadership is still uncertain
- economic growth is being held back
